John and Tim's Story

In my eulogy for my partner Tim (pictured), I wrote, "It isn't fair to try to condense the love you have for someone into a few words. Mere words are not sufficient to describe the deep love you had for someone or your breaking heart when they are so cruelly taken from you far too early." I find myself in the same position writing to thank you and your team for all the support and help they gave Tim and me; mere words are not sufficient.

Tim and I were both police officers in London when we met over 30 years ago and had been together ever since. When I retired in 2013, we moved to Cumbria and bought what was to be our forever home. Sadly, in September 2015 Tim caught Meningitis and six weeks later he was released from intensive care with an acquired brain injury. The main result of this was a complete loss of his memory regarding everyone and everything his life had consisted of, and worse an inability to make new memories which lasted more than three days. But we struggled through with the 'new normal'. Sadly, Tim was also in the top three patients with the worst sinus issues in the country, but he fought through everything, frequently leaving me in awe of his resilience. Alas, in August 2022 while in hospital for a sinus operation it was discovered that Tim had untreatable and inoperable kidney cancer.

It was about this time as my own mental state began to deteriorate that my doctor recommended me to your bereavement team in spite of my reluctance. Police officers, even retired ones, don't need help; how wrong I was. I suppose my letter should be split into two parts. The first is to thank Alison, the bereavement counsellor who has been supporting me since Tim received his terminal cancer diagnosis. All I can say now is that without her support and advice, I doubt I would still be here. How she did it, I am not sure, I was not the most receptive person to start with. But, Alison stuck with me, both comforting and challenging my perceptions at the same time. I am eternally grateful to her. As I said, mere words are not sufficient.

Secondly, I would like to thank the palliative nursing team members who came out to care for Tim during the last week of his life. Again, I was convinced I could cope and was resistant to Alison's suggestion to involve them. I could care for Tim, I didn't need strangers helping. Weeks passed before I finally relented as it dawned on me, I was not coping, caring for Tim's growing need and getting enough sleep to recharge my own batteries. My unexpected emotion of relief at being able to hand over to someone else took me by surprise. But that first night I slept through for the first time in weeks. All of your nursing staff are 'Angels'. They didn't know Tim at all, and yet, their compassion and the care they provided to Tim and I was beyond anything I was expecting. Again, mere words are not sufficient to thank them.

Tim died on the morning of Saturday the 16th of November, with me by his side holding his hand. Few people really appreciate that their actions can impact so much on other people. It is not the big things we do that are important in life, it is the small unsung ones that impact the most.

Barry's Story

Barry kindly shares why he has a deep connection to Hospice at Home and why he has made a decision to leave a Gift in his Will

Back in 2011, after years of battling illness and undergoing numerous treatments and surgeries, my family and I were delivered the devastating news that Sheena, my beloved wife aged just 45, was to enter palliative care. This was an earth-shattering moment for all of us. Sheena expressed her wish to spend her final days at home, surrounded by our family, including our daughters, Lauren and Stephanie.



Initially, everything seemed manageable until Sheena's medical needs began to surpass my capacity to care for her alone, particularly during the night. Our GP recommended Hospice at Home, and from that moment onward, they became our lifeline. They provided incredible support, tending to Sheena through the night, offering hand and foot massages, and even providing bereavement counselling. They helped us come to terms with our present reality and understand the road ahead.

I recall one sleepless night when I went downstairs to make a cup of tea and was startled to find a nurse calmly knitting in my living room. It took me a moment to remember she was there to care for Sheena. During our chat, she revealed that over three-quarters of the services we were receiving were funded by charitable donations. I was completely gobsmacked, and even now, in 2025, that revelation still resonates deeply with me.



The level of professionalism and compassion we received from Hospice at Home was beyond anything I could have imagined. It was truly overwhelming, and it's one of the reasons I've dedicated myself to raising funds through various sporting challenges like cycling across Cuba, California, and the Coast to Coast route, as well as participating in the Great North Run. I've also volunteered my time, collecting Christmas trees and taking part in charity collections in the centre of Carlisle.

As I approach my 60th year, I've recently updated my will and made a significant decision to leave a legacy gift to Hospice at Home Carlisle and North Lakeland.

Their unwavering support and dedication during Sheena's final journey left an indelible mark on our lives. Collaborating for Patient Independence

Eden Valley Hospice and Our Occupational Therapists

Since July 2024, we have been proud to collaborate with Eden Valley Hospice to share an Occupational Therapist role, further enhancing the care and support offered to our community. Twice a week, funded by both charities, our community Occupational Therapists visit the hospice, contributing their expertise to the multi-disciplinary team. Staff from both organisations work together to manage complex moving and handling needs, playing a vital role in supporting patients as they transition between the hospices inpatient unit and their homes.



Occupational Therapists source essential equipment and adaptations like wheelchairs and stair lifts. By our charities working closely together, along with statutory services, this results in a smoother discharge process and helps patients regain independence in their homes.

Beyond practical support, our Occupational Therapists collaborate with carers, identifying additional services through Hospice at Home. This can include complementary therapies, respite care, or simply offering a listening ear. Often, the greatest gift is providing patients and carers the space to share their concerns, knowing they have someone to turn to when the time feels right. This partnership has fostered continuity, offering patients the comfort of a familiar face and ongoing support for those with complex needs. With the majority of funding coming from community fundraising efforts, we've already been able to assist 81 patients since the collaboration began.



Occupational Therapy

Independence means different things to different people. For most, it's about being able to do the activities that matter to them.

Occupational Therapy helps people stay as independent as possible for as long as they can. It focuses on making life enjoyable and productive, even with a life limiting illness. Staying active can improve mood, well-being, and quality of life.

Illnesses can cause symptoms like breathlessness or anxiety. These or other symptoms can get in the way of daily life. Occupational Therapists teach techniques to manage these symptoms, helping people stay more active.

Tessa and her Dad, Simon's Story

This is a love story. About A dad. A friend. A husband. A Legend. A story about a difficult time that was made special in the comfort of home with the things most important to Simon, mainly his family.

Dad was diagnosed with pulmonary fibrosis in the March of 2020. Being a man who grafted and worked all his life – he continued to do this right up until he couldn't any longer. Even taking his mobile oxygen tanks with him walking across fields and driving all around his beloved Eden Valley and beyond.



He had to stop working in November 2022. I took him for the final appointment with his consultant where he was then sent home for best supportive care, at home.

I took that wording very seriously. This would be the BEST of the BEST supportive care and I knew I had to involve the right people to help us with this. The support we had from the community teams was invaluable.

Being a district nurse myself I had a lot of knowledge about what we needed putting in place. The last few months we had with dad at home were filled with all things family. Dad was always the chef in our family until he could no longer manage these exhausting tasks. Mum and I took over the cooking. Dad was a lover of Eastern and Asian foods, knowing that I was visiting Manchester he sent me on a trip to one of his favourite Chinese Supermarkets to get supplies for making spring rolls. Dad gave me the recipe for a filling which I made and then we all sat at the table as a family rolling our homemade spring rolls after Dad showing us how, then enjoyed eating them together. We also had a few other birthday celebrations at home in that time and put together an afternoon tea at the table which meant Dad was able to be part of it.

I took some time off work to care for Dad which allowed my mum to continue working. It was when I was thinking about going back to work that Dad agreed for the district nurses to refer him to Hospice at Home. Dad had a few visits from the girls which allowed me to go back to work and mum to focus on her special time to be with him as his wife. They brought us the shampoo caps which were so useful. I was happy to know that the team was involved so that my family could look to them for support and any questions when I wasn't there.

We enjoyed time with Dad listening to music, watching old films, seeing old friends and just as the spring came along with the bluebells Dad passed away at home on 2nd April 2023 with the love of his life holding his hand and our family there moments after. The times we had with Dad at home were so special and it is something I am so grateful for, that I saw first-hand what a good death looks like.

I have always had an interest in working within palliative care and I was glad to know that losing dad pushed me even further to strive for others to experience special, comfortable and memorable moments in their last months...weeks...days.



When a role came up at Hospice at Home, I felt this was right and have enjoyed working as Deputy Head of Clinical Services since September last year. It is a privilege and a pleasure to get to know our patients and families and see the rewarding work that the nursing team provide on a daily basis. My favourite part of my job is hearing the feedback and stories from families about how the services we are able to provide, have made a difficult time just that little bit easier.
